ICATT’s 54th Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held virtually on Thursday, 28 March 2024, and I was given the mandate to serve the Institute, and the profession, by fulfilling the duties of ICATT President for the 2024/25 term.

At the AGM, **eighty-four (84)** ICATT members voted electronically on various resolutions including the election of five members to serve on ICATT’s 12-member Council after vacancies arose. Re-elected to Council were Christopher Ramjit, Managing Principal of CR Next Generation Chartered Accountants; Edmund Phillips, Financial Institution Supervision Department of the Central Bank of Trinidad and Tobago; Renée-Lisa Philip, Managing Director of PKF Trinidad and Tobago; and I, Marissa Quashie, Partner at EY.

Continuing their service to Council were immediate Vice President, Adrienne D’Arcy, Country Managing Partner, EY Trinidad and Tobago; Dinesh Bhola, Principal of D.S. Bhola & Co. and the Managing Director of DSB Financial Solutions Ltd.; Keith André Mills, Consultant; Haseeb Mohammed, Part-Time Lecturer; Desmond Dial, Assurance Director at PwC; and Tamara Sieuraj, Audit Manager at Vistar Financial Services and the Treasurer of the Penal/Debe Chamber of Commerce.

The new elect Member joining the 2024/2025 Council is Tanya Wright, and she brings fresh insight and perspective to the executive committee. Tanya is a Director at KPMG, and she has amassed over 20 years of audit and assurance expertise. With a focus on insurance and financial institutions, she also serves as the Director of Learning and Development for KPMG Caricom. Following the first Council meeting, Arun Seenath, Partner at Deloitte & Touche was also elected to serve as Vice-President for the 2024/2025 Term.

A STRATEGIC VISION

As an organisation, having a strategic plan provides a clear direction, allowing us to anticipate future challenges and opportunities, make informed decisions, allocate resources effectively, and work towards achieving long-term goals.

I'm proud to say that we will be completing another phase of the Institute's journey as charted by the our three year phase **Strategic Plan: Driving Sustainability, Reinforcing Trust**. Built on a strong foundation, we used the strategic pillars of **Quality Assurance, Membership Value, Brand Impact and Financial Sustainability** to add new levels of accomplishment and opportunities for our membership and the wider professional community.

We also recognise that progress is a continuous journey and we are excited to share our accomplishments for 2024/2025, a testament to our service as the nation's Professional Accountancy Organisation (PAO).

Every step of this 55-year journey ties into ICATT's Strategic Vision to further ensure the accomplishment of its mandate as set by Act 33 of Parliament in 1970. We remain steadfast and focused on our Vision:

INNOVATION

Innovation is the cornerstone of progress, and at ICATT, we understand that our ability to drive meaningful change is closely tied to our capacity for innovation. Throughout 2024, we focused on fostering an environment where new ideas can flourish, where creativity is encouraged and where bold thinking is celebrated.

Over the past year, our efforts to promote innovation within the accounting profession took several forms. For example, our advocacy efforts have led to impactful changes in policy, ensuring that our voices are heard at the national level.

We have collaborated with key stakeholders to promote best practices and ethical standards, reinforcing the integrity of our profession. This includes the adoption of the 2024 IESBA Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants, which replaced the 2021 Code of Ethics. In moving with this momentum, we are championing the implementation of the International Public Sector and Accounting Standards in 2025.

ICATT's commitment to innovation extends internally as we continually integrate relevant standards that benefit our professional community. Demonstrating this intent are the adoption of IFRS 17 as well as Sustainability Standards S1 and S2 as part of the evolving ESG Agenda.

Even as we adopt international standards, we ensure that our local standards adhere to best practices and emulate the quality that is expected by the finance and accounting professionals in the Trinidad and Tobago. This is why, in 2024, we drafted amendments to the ICATT Legislation to ensure the profession is effectively regulated. These serve to further safeguard the profession and ensure the institute's expanded responsibility as a matter of public interest.

CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT

One major highlight of 2024 was the enhancement of our Continuing Professional Development (CPD) offerings. We increased our diverse array of webinars, workshops and on-demand online courses, designed to be accessible to our members regardless of location or schedule. These resources enabled us to reach more professionals than ever before with well over 600 professionals accepting the opportunity to learn, grow, and continuously refine their expertise throughout the year.

The accounting profession is one that thrives on precision, accuracy and innovation, and we recognise that staying at the forefront of these elements, demands a steadfast commitment to continuous growth and improvement.

Over the past year, we further expanded our series of high-level certification/CPD programmes to ensure that our members are equipped with the knowledge and skills to excel in an ever-changing environment.

In addition, we have established partnerships with leading educational institutions and thought leaders in the industry to ensure that the content we provide is relevant, progressive and of the highest quality. This is also demonstrated by our partnership with the Association of International Certified Professional Accountants and the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (AICPA & CIMA) to deliver the prestigious Chartered Global Management Accountant (CGMA) Finance Leadership Programme to Trinidad and Tobago nationals.

This emphasis on continuous improvement also extends to our internal processes. We have implemented new quality assurance frameworks, conducted regular reviews of our educational programmes, boosted and leveraged the ICATT brand and sought constant feedback from our members to ensure that we are meeting their needs and expectations. By continuously evaluating and refining our programmes and services, we are ensuring that we remain a trusted partner in the professional development of accountants in our country.

TECHNOLOGY & ADVANCEMENT

Technology is now a driving force in every aspect and the Accounting profession is undergoing a profound transformation as it reshapes how we work, engage with clients and how we deliver value to the profession we serve. From artificial intelligence to blockchain and cloud computing. Technology is fundamentally changing the way we approach accounting and financial management. Recognising this, the Institute has placed a strong emphasis on staying ahead of the technological curve.

This commitment was demonstrated in our CPD offerings, which provided insight and training in data analytics and forecasting, big data, cybersecurity, advisory accounting services, automated processes and Artificial Intelligence. In keeping with this directive, we are also looking at investment in the development of digital tools and platforms that will enhance the productivity, efficiency and accuracy of ICATT and provide added benefits to our membership and the wider assembly of stakeholders.

COLLABORATION

Collaboration has always been a key factor in our success, and 2024 was no exception. In an increasingly interconnected world, the ability to work together across borders, industries and disciplines is essential to achieving lasting success. ICATT has worked over the years to elevate the voice of accountants in policy discussions; advocating for the profession's role in promoting transparency, accountability and ethical business practices. As demonstrated last year, through our advocacy efforts, we have successfully influenced policy decisions that will shape the future of accounting and financial reporting into the future.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The Institute has reported total revenue for 2024 of \$5,066,490. This represents a 6.97% increase from 2023. The increase in revenue can be attributed to a 13.76% increase in 'Student's Subscriptions, Fees & Subvention' and a 3.9% increase in 'Members' Subscription & Fees. Alongside the increases in income derived from Members and Students there was an increase of 7.18% in 'Other Income' with profit from seminars and other events being a significant contributor (7.87% Increase).

A surplus of \$473,312 (9.34%) has been posted for the year ended 31 December 2024. By comparison, the 2023 surplus was \$390,589 (8.25%). The continued surplus for 2024 relate largely to member support of the AIFAC as well as online CPD programmes.

ICATT's total operating expenditure for the year ended 31 December 2024 was \$4,565,558 which is an increase from 2023 by 5.72%. Whereas Other Expenses increased in 2024 by 13.98% over 2023 there was a decrease to Employees' Salaries and Benefits by 4.49%.

There were no significant additions to the Institutes Non-Current Assets for 2024 resulting in a decrease in depreciation and amortisation expenditure of 22.48%.

The Institute's total investments decreased by 1.04% for the year ended 31 December 2024. It is noted that the total Cash and Cash Equivalents increased by a total of 16.93% with an increase to Cash at Bank of 64.88%. Further investments will be made following the positive 2024 performance, in line with the Institute's investment policy.

A WIDER CONTRIBUTION

As the regulatory accounting organization, ICATT is committed to making viable, sustainable contributions as an active component of the national framework.

Environmental, social, and governance, or ESG, has become critical in shaping local and global perspectives, and ICATT has demonstrated that sustainability is high on our agenda, even as we advocate for responsible practices within our shared profession.

We have always recognised through wider collaboration, we can demonstrate how accounting is an essential part of creating a more sustainable future. We have endeavoured to show that apart from being accounting professionals, we are accountable for our actions.

In terms of embracing our role, we will be expanding the exploration of the volunteer initiatives we outlined last year. We will create opportunities where members will be invited to contribute their time and skills to local non-profits and other worthwhile initiatives. In contributing selflessly to national development, we will increase the value of our profession and continue to build strong connections with one another and expanding infinitely outward.

This desire to contribute to national advancement will include embracing a dynamic vision and utilising pragmatic, all tempered by meaningful feedback from all stakeholders. The Institute will continue to facilitate avenues for communications, so that all meaningful input will shape our mutual evolution.



LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Reflecting on the past year, I am inspired by the resilience, innovation and leadership demonstrated by our members and our hard-working Council and Secretariat. Together, we have set a new standard for excellence in the accounting profession, and are well-positioned to lead as we navigate future challenges and opportunities.

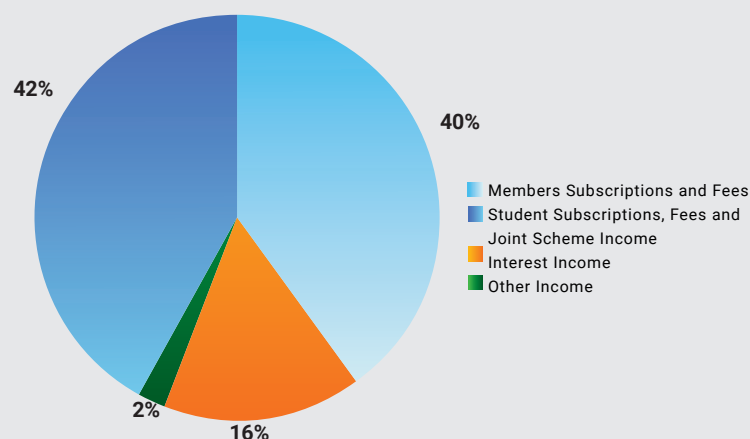

REVENUE BREAKDOWN

The Total Revenue for the period ended 31 December 2024 was \$5,066,490 which represents 6.97% increase from 2023 figure of \$4,736,208. This increase was mainly due to increases in Student's Subscriptions, Fees & Subvention and Other Income which includes profit from seminars by over \$243,000 cumulatively.

The increase in Other Income was highlighted by a 7.9% (\$155,887) increase from seminars moving from \$1,980,649 in 2023 to \$2,136,535 in 2024. A significant contributor to this increase would have been the six additional webinars held in 2024 versus 10 for 2023 with 80% of the total seminars/ webinars exceeded the budgeted targets. A spotlight of this improvement continues to be the over subscription to Annual Conference and the consistent performance of the IFRS seminar.

Focusing on the AIFAC 2024, there was a 27% (\$514,200) increase in income from this event when compared to the previous year. This was due to the increase in the number of participants moving from 418 in 2023 to 493 in 2024. The income from the event exceeded expectations when compared to the forecasted figures by almost \$200,000 mainly because of the significant increase to the participant numbers.

Expenditure on the other hand, also increased by 5.72% in 2024 when compared to 2023. The major contributor to this increase was other operating expenses which increased by 12.69% while on the other hand Public Relations and Employees' Salaries and Benefits decreased in 2024. Noteworthy, Employees' Salaries and Benefits decrease of 4.49% was due to the exclusion of a trade dispute settlement of \$75,000 incurred in 2023. It should be noted that even though there was an overall increase in expenditure when compared to 2023, these costs were less than budgeted for the period by 1%.

Overall, the institute reported a surplus of \$473,312 for 2024; a 21.2% increase when compared to 2023. This is attributable to the overall increase in income and the continued prudent management of expenditure in accordance with budgets. The year-end Total Assets amounted to \$8,203,111 while the Accumulated Fund stood at \$5,466,223.

TRAINING ON DEMAND

One of the defining features of the past year has been our continued focus on fostering an environment where innovation and excellence thrive. From expanding educational opportunities and enhancing member services to providing valuable resources and strengthening stakeholder partnerships, we have made meaningful strides that reinforce our commitment to the profession.

Four years into the transformation of this aspect of ICATT's portfolio, our flexible webinar series features an ever-expanding scope of cutting-edge and industry-relevant offerings including on-demand assets. Based on the positive feedback received, this facility continues to be a convenient and valuable mechanism for members and other professionals to either maintain their required Continuing Professional Development (CPD) units or to update and expand their skillsets.

The Council and Secretariat continue to collaborate in order to ensure that every course offered is in synchronicity with emerging global trends as well as anticipated changes

Chairman's Overview	<p>The Auditing and Accounting Standards Committee (AASC) continues to play a pivotal role in delivering training sessions on pertinent IFRS topics, ensuring that the content is current and relevant for practitioners and contributing to the ongoing professional development of our members and the wider accounting community.</p> <p>In response to the emergence of IFRS Sustainability Standards, the committee has approved a plan to sensitize and train stakeholders on the use and disclosures required.</p> <p>AASC remains vigilant in its commitment to offer a Trinidad and Tobago perspective in the global standard-setting arena. This involves a meticulous review of exposure drafts from both IFRS and ISAs, guaranteeing that our unique regional insights are effectively communicated to standard setters. During the year, committee members along with the Chairman have undertaken to respond on Discussion papers and Exposure drafts which were considered relevant to the national accounting landscape.</p> <p>Through these multifaceted initiatives, the AASC continues to be at the forefront of shaping and influencing accounting and assurance standards in a manner that reflects the distinct needs and nuances of Trinidad and Tobago.</p>	
Summary of Activities	<p>The Auditing and Accounting Standards Committee convened for a total of five (5) meetings during the 2024/2025 term, actively steering various projects and activities aimed at elevating standards and practices within the accounting profession.</p> <p>Through these initiatives, the Auditing and Accounting Standards Committee demonstrated a proactive stance in addressing key challenges, fostering collaboration with stakeholders, and ensuring the profession's alignment with international best practices. This approach reflects the committee's commitment to excellence, ethical conduct, and the continued advancement of the accounting standards.</p> <p>Key accomplishments during this term include:</p> <p>Review of AML Report Template</p> <p>The committee reviewed the Anti-Money Laundering (AML) Report Template, to ensure its relevance and effectiveness in combating financial crimes. A meeting with Central Bank of Trinidad and Tobago has been agreed to discuss the AML report.</p> <p>Education on IFRS S1 & S2</p> <p>The committee approved a plan to sensitize members on the impact of IFRS Sustainability Standards S1 and S2 in the ensuing year.</p> <p>New Audit Standard for Less Complex Entities</p> <p>A position paper on the sensitization and implementation approach to the training to be conducted as it relates to the LCE standards, and the new guidance available from IAASB on Using the ISA for LCE has been approved and will be implemented in the ensuing year.</p>	

DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS AND APPEALS PANEL

END OF TERM REPORT 2024/25

Appointments to the Disciplinary Proceedings Panel and to the Appeals Panel are deemed fit and proper to serve from time to time and on a case by case basis as follows:

- a). Investigation Tribunals
- b). Disciplinary Tribunals
- c). Appeals Committees

All Members shall be drawn from the respectively Panel.

The Disciplinary Proceedings Panel and the Appeals Panel comprises of not more than 30 Members; and 6 of whom shall be non-accountants and 6 shall be attorneys-at-law. Appointment to the respective Panels shall be for a period of 3 years; and members shall be eligible for re-appointment for a further period of 3 years.

Tribunal means the group of persons selected from the Disciplinary Proceedings Panel to adjudicate on Investigatory and Disciplinary matters.

Investigation Tribunals

Investigation Tribunals shall be appointed on a case by case basis from the Disciplinary Proceedings Panel.

The functions of an Investigation Tribunal shall be:

- a). to investigate suspected or alleged acts of improper or unprofessional conduct;
- b). to get clarification as to the suspected or alleged act of improper or unprofessional conduct; and
- c). to ensure that the suspected or alleged act of improper or unprofessional conduct can be properly supported, with a view to considering and deciding whether there is sufficient merit in a complaint or suspected act of improper or unprofessional conduct to warrant the matter being referred to a Disciplinary Tribunal.

Disciplinary Tribunals

Disciplinary Tribunals shall be appointed on a case by case basis from the Disciplinary Proceedings Panel. No Member who has referred a matter to or who has served on the Investigation Tribunal may be a member of the Disciplinary Tribunal that deals with the case in relation to that matter. The function of a Disciplinary Tribunal is to hear and determine cases referred to it by an Investigation Tribunal and the Licensing Committee.

Appeals Committees

Members of an Appeals Committee shall be drawn from the Appeals Panel. The function of an Appeals Committee is to hear and determine appeals against:

- a). refusal of membership by Council
- b). decisions of Investigation and Disciplinary Tribunals
- c). decisions of the Licensing Committee, and
- d). to provide a machinery for the correction of error.

<p>SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES</p>	<p>For the 2024-2025 term, the Investigation Tribunal, Disciplinary Tribunals, and Appeals Committee of ICATT’s Disciplinary Proceedings and Appeals Panel have diligently addressed the referred matters. The following provides details of matters received during this term:</p> <p>Investigation Tribunal</p> <p>The Investigation Tribunal received two complaints.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Regarding the complaint received in 2024, although the issue appeared to merit reporting to ICATT, the complainant ultimately decided not to proceed as the complainant did not provide sufficient evidence to substantiate the claims. Given the lack of supporting evidence and the complainant’s decision not to assist further, the Tribunal determined that there was no prima facie case. Consequently, the investigation could not proceed or be referred to the Disciplinary Tribunal.• An additional complaint was received in February 2025. The Committee is in the process of confirming its composition before proceeding with deliberations. <p>Disciplinary Tribunal</p> <p>The Disciplinary Tribunal received two Statements of Allegations: one from the Investigation Tribunal and the other from the Licensing Committee.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Regarding the matter referred by the Investigation Tribunal, the Member was reprimanded for the breaches and provided with copies of the Code of Professional and Ethical Conduct, along with guidance on ICATT members’ roles and responsibilities to external auditors in accordance with ICATT’s Rules and Regulations. The Order also required the Member to enrol in an ICATT-approved Ethics CPD course. Additionally, the Member was advised of the responsibilities of Directors of Finance and Audit Committee Chairmen, as outlined in ICATT’s Rules and Regulations.• Regarding the matter referred by the Licensing Committee to the Disciplinary Tribunal on November 7, 2024, the Tribunal was in the process of scheduling a Disciplinary Hearing to consider the statement of allegations dated November 7, 2024. As the Tribunal was informed that the Member’s Auditing Certificate or practising status lapsed in October 2024, and the membership status had been reclassified to that of a Non-Practising Member (MNP), due to the failure to submit a renewal application for an auditing certificate, the pending disciplinary proceedings have been suspended. <p>Appeals Committee</p> <p>The Appeals Committee reviewed matters referred by the Council concerning decisions of the Investigations Tribunals.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• In the first case, the Committee determined that the referral had exceeded the allowable timeframe, leading to the dismissal of the appeal, with no order as to costs.• A second matter is currently under review but has been suspended due to conflict-of-interest concerns. The Committee is still in the process of confirming a new composition before proceeding with deliberation.

This represents an increase of 7% in the proportion of satisfactory reviews from 2023 to 2024.</p> <p>Several CPD programs were organized for our practising members, with a dual focus on strengthening audit practices and enhancing technical competence. - Using reasonable and prudent judgment in the determination of estimates.



Accounting Policies
for the year ended 31 December, 2024

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these Financial Statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years.

a.) Basis of Preparation

These Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities (IFRS for SMEs) under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of available-for-sale investments. The preparation of Financial Statements in conformity with the IFRS for SMEs requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the Institute's accounting policies.

b.) Financial Instruments

Financial instruments carried on the Statement of Financial Position include cash and cash equivalents, receivables, accounts payable and are stated at their approximate fair values determined in accordance with the policy statements disclosed.

c.) Use of Estimates

The preparation of Financial Statements in conformity with IFRS for SMEs requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the Financial Statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

d.) Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. The Institute adds to the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment the cost of replacing parts of such an item when that cost is incurred if the replacement part is expected to provide incremental future benefits to the Institute. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised.

All other costs associated with repairs and maintenance are charged to the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income during the period in which they are incurred. Depreciation on other assets is charged so as to allocate the cost over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Office premises	-	2% per annum on the straight-line basis
Office equipment	-	20% per annum on the reducing balance basis
Computer equipment	-	33.33% per annum on the reducing balance basis
Furniture, fixtures and fittings	-	10% per annum on the reducing balance basis

The residual values of assets and their useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each Statement of Financial Position date.

Profits or losses on disposal of property and equipment are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount and are included in administrative expenses in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income, thus reducing or increasing these expenses as appropriate.

Property and Equipment are reviewed for impairment losses whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the carrying amount of the asset exceeds its recoverable amount, which is the higher of an asset's net selling price and value in use.

Accounting Policies

for the year ended 31 December, 2024 (continued)

e.) Intangible Assets

Intangible Assets are purchased computer software that is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. It is amortised over its estimated useful life at 33.33% per annum on the reducing balance basis. If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in amortisation rate, useful life or residual value of an intangible asset, the amortisation is revised prospectively to reflect the new expectations.

f.) Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are carried at original invoice amount less provision made for impairment of these receivables. A provision for impairment of trade receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the Institute will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables. The amount of the provision is the difference between the carrying amount and the recoverable amount. Provisions for impairment of receivables are included in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income.

g.) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents are carried in the Statement of Financial Position at cost and comprise cash in hand, cash at bank, funds held in Trinidad and Tobago Dollar (TTD) and United States Dollar (USD) Income Funds, and other short-term highly liquid investments.

h.) Accounts Payable

Accounts Payable are obligations on the basis of normal credit terms and do not bear interest. Accounts payable are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

i.) Deferred Income

Subscriptions received in the current year for the following year are recorded as a liability. These amounts are then transferred to revenue in the year to which they relate. Members' and students' prepayments are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

j.) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Institute has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount has been reliably estimated. Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses. Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of the expenditure expected to be required to settle the obligation using a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the obligation. The increase in the provision due to passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

k.) Foreign Currency Translation

a) Functional and Presentation Currency

Items included in the Financial Statements of the Institute are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Institute operates ('the functional currency'). These Financial Statements are presented in Trinidad and Tobago Dollars (TTD), which is the Institute's functional and presentation currency.

b) Transactions and Balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income. All other foreign exchange gains and losses are presented in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income within Other Income.

l.) Pensions

The Institute has a defined contribution plan. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the Institute pays fixed contributions into a separate entity and has no legal or constructive obligations to pay further contributions if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods. The Institute pays contributions to publicly or privately administered pension insurance plans on a mandatory or contractual basis. The contributions are recognised as employee benefit expense when they are due. If contribution payments exceed the contribution due for service, the excess is recognised as an asset.

m.) Revenue Recognition

Revenue comprises the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the sale of goods and services in the ordinary course of the Institute's activities and it is recognised on an accrual basis.

Subscription Income

Student and membership subscriptions are initially recorded as deferred revenue and are recognised on a straight-line basis over the period to which they relate.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognised on the accrual basis.

Seminar and Events Income

Income from seminars and events is recognised on a net basis once the event has been held. Income collected or expenses incurred are deferred if received or incurred in advance of the seminar or event.

n.) Taxation

The charge to taxation is computed using currently enacted rates in respect of the year of income under review on taxable profits derived from income streams that are subject to a charge to tax under the Income Tax and Corporation Tax Acts respectively. Business Levy is computed at the rate of 0.6% on revenues that are subject to tax under the taxing provisions except for membership dues and subscription fees which are exempted under the Income Tax and Corporation Tax Acts. Green Fund Levy is computed at the rate of 0.3% on revenues that are subject to tax under the taxing provisions previously mentioned.

1 Incorporation and Activities

The Institute of Chartered Accountants of Trinidad and Tobago (the Institute) was incorporated by Act No. 33 of 1970 and is domiciled in the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago with its registered office located at 2nd Floor, Building A, Professional Centre, 11-13 Fitzblackman Drive South, Woodbrook, Port of Spain. The Institute's activities are to regulate the ethics, discipline, professional conduct and standards of its members and students and to promote and increase the knowledge, skill and proficiency of its members and students.

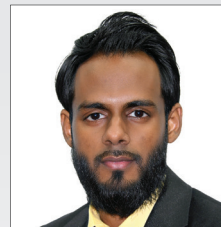

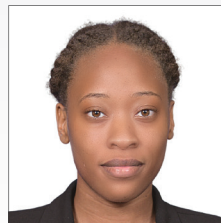
